

A PLACE TO RECHARGE

A mechanech with years of experience working with teens in local yeshivos, Rabbi Frankl envisioned setting up a sanctuary for children, a place flowing with positive energy where they could recharge and acquire skills in productive recreation. Rabbi Frankl wanted the chance

to instill in children success and build their confidence, all while gently guiding them, stroke by loving stroke.

"Many children don't know what success is, how success feels," Rabbi Frankl says, explaining that most children who struggle simply have not been taught another way. "And when a child tastes success, knows how good it feels, suddenly he wants to know success in a blatt Gemara, too."

ANSWERING THE CALL

Rabbi Frankl posed the idea to *rabbanim* and *mechanchim*, and the response was passionate. Not only did he get heartfelt *haskamos*, but each Torah leader and *mechanech* urged him to launch this

deavor. His years of experience in *chinuch*, rounded out by his creative skills, made Rabbi Frankl the perfect candidate to establish a program to fill this crucial need.

"The Gemara in Chullin says that one should give young children old *keilim* to break," Rabbi Frankl's *rav* told him, pointing out that many children need an escape from the frustration they face, and he pushed him to go ahead and provide Monsey children with a safe sanctuary to de-stress.

"When a child does not get along with authority, peers, or even family members, it usually stems from unreleased tension," Rabbi Frankl shares. Giving them a productive outlet changes children — and Mein Platz can attest to that every day.

From the start and throughout its operation, Rabbi Frankl has been discussing every step with

daas Torah and is in touch with local menahalim on a daily basis, working with them to ensure that every child's experience is optimized.

JUST WHAT WE NEED

"When seeking recreational options for my sons, I'm always hard-pressed for ideas," Mrs. Stein, a mother of several energetic

boys, shares. "An activity is either not in vogue with our lifestyle, or instructors do not match our level of *heimishkeit*. But trust me, my boys need to let off steam somewhere. Otherwise we all suffer." Mothers all over share her predicament.

Mein Platz offers just what had been lacking in our community: classes led by *heimishe* staff of which each member is not only skilled in their field, but is a *mechanech* par excellence with experience in bringing out the best in children.

spect for children and their abilities.

when it is needed, but, as one school psychologist whom Mein Platz consults with regularly says, "I can't give the kids in therapy what you give them at your center." The staff at both the boys and girls locations are trained as mentors so they can draw out their students and make each interaction with children and teens a meaningful one.

A PLACE FOR THE GIRLS

Too good of an idea to keep for boys alone, Mein Platz quickly expanded with a separate division launched especially for girls, directed by Mrs. Zissy Rosenberg. Mrs. Rosenberg oversees the classes — among them dance, cooking, baking, ballet, music, graphic design and inspirational classes — for girls from elementary school, high school and even for women.

EXERCISE WITH AN EDGE

Before the sun even rises at this time of year, Mein Platz is already pulsing with energy to the beats of the exercise class for boys and men. This rigorous workout is led by instructor Zalmen Danziger, who gets the men who decided to ditch the gym and join this bootcamp–style class in shape the right way. There are two classes daily, one at 7 a.m. and another at 9 p.m.

THE STORIES

Running such an operation doesn't leave much time for rest, but it's the success stories that energize Rabbi Frankl. He speaks of the boy who was being bullied in *cheder* and how their staff zoned

in on his singing ability — and along with his beautiful voice, his self-confidence soared. He now attends school with his head held high. Rabbi Frankl also speaks about the child who'd come in after school each day like a hurricane wind, and after signing

up at Mein Platz where he unwinds in a healthy manner, is a changed child at home. Then Rabbi Frankl speaks of the child with selective mutism who slowly found her voice at Mein Platz and then went on to speak in school.

SO MUCH MORE THAN RECREATION

There's a lot happening behind the doors of Mein Platz, with classes and lessons taking place from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. The morning starts with exercise class for boys and men. Throughout the

school day, Mein Platz sees boys coming and going for private tutoring, individualized classes in many subjects, and amazing learning programs, like the newly launched Mila d'Mila program under Rabbi Yaakov Menachem Hirsch that breaks boys into the world of Gemara. The afternoon finds the place a hub of recreational activities of all sorts with attendance of children from all over Monsey. Courses geared for teens and adults are scheduled in the evening.

GROWING, GROWING AND EXPANDING STILL

From its humble beginnings in Rabbi Frankl's basement, Mein Platz keeps growing. Due to overwhelming demand and expansion, Mein Platz's boys program is relocating once again, this time to a beautiful 5,000-square-foot location at 51 Main Street in the heart of Monsey. The girls program will move to the 3 Edwin Lane location.

With an eye to the future, Rabbi Frankl keeps advancing his goal of making the world a better place for so many, one child at a time.

Because Monsey's children need someone to believe in them, to embrace them and to tell them with confidence, "Yes, you can, and you will!" And no one does that better than Mein Platz.
